

## Covid-19 Returing to Work

During these unprecedented times some of the vehicles in your customers' commercial fleet may be parked up. With this in mind Zurich have put together some potentially useful advice to help keep their vehicles safe. We have also included some additional risk management advice in respect of other notable risk exposures as we move through the phased return to work:

- Vehicles should be locked and parked in the most **secure location** possible.
- If a number of vehicles are parked in one location, try to allow as much space as possible between the vehicles (In the event that fire breaks out to this will help control the spread).
- It is important during Covid-19 disruption to continue to comply with relevant legislation including: maintaining vehicles in roadworthy condition (regardless of extension to CVRT and NCT testing) and drivers hours regulations for heavy goods and public service vehicles as appropriate, as well as carrying out appropriate driver walk around checks in order to identify and repair defects.
- When starting all vehicles for the first time after a long period of inactivity, a thorough defect
  identification (walk around) check should be carried out and documented concentrating on wheels,
  tyres, brakes, etc. before use. The vehicle may not start or you may see warning lights on the display
  and in the event that this happens it's important to follow manufacturer guidelines so as not to
  invalidate any warranty on the vehicle.
- All vehicles should be **cleaned and disinfected regularly** and provide **cleaning equipment/disinfectant wipes** for your employees to use in the work vehicle, along with hand sanitizer.
- As people return to work, more vehicles will be on the roads as people may avoid public transport and make more solo car journeys. Specific action should be taken to identify and manage the risks associated with vulnerable road users like pedestrians and cyclists.
- Managing driver health and safety is more important than ever at this time. Current handbooks/instruction manuals etc. must reflect the changes in work practices required in order to show compliance to all rules and regulations as instructed by the Irish Government in collaboration with the HSA and HSE including full details of risk assessment performed.
